Within the rapture of our Shop...

THE PHYSICAL BICAS SPACE lies not only at the crossroads of 7th and Ventura, but of mechanics and innovation. A sculpture of reclaimed bicycle parts frames the Work Trade area, where community members earn parts and bikes.

Murals stretch across our walls. The hum of community fills the air — each on their own journeys in creativity, self-sufficiency and empowerment.


In 2024, our Community Tools,
Work Trade, and Community
Service programs were busier than
ever, allowing our knowledgeable
mechanics to offer hands-on
guidance six days a week.
Continually, we strive to curate our
community space as one where
people have access to bikes, learn,
and the sense of community
belonging — culminating 2024 year
with an expansion of our weekend
hours.

Labor Day Sale

Trailing the shadow of summer's slow days, BICAS held a weeklong a Labor Day sale in **September** with discounts as low as **75%** off for our community. Not only do the price drops aid accessibility, but wide promotion of this sale brought new people into BICAS, who learned more about our yearlong mission of bicycle accessibility through programs like Work Trade and Community Tools. The sale generated \$18,607 in revenue, helping sustain our programs to make cycling accessible to all.

Staff Development

Our mechanics prioritize keeping up-to-date with the ever-evolving bicycle technology, in order to optimally serve our community. Our staff trainings empowers us to assist our community with whatever repairs are needed to keep put them safely back on the road. In 2024, staff participated in 6 advanced mechanics trainings. Additionally, we hired 5 new collective members, to more fully help our community in the shop.



Community Tools

The heart of our programs, the Community Tools program strives to empower confidence and skill for people to fix their own bikes, promoting reliable and accessible transportation. Priced on a sliding scale, our mechanics tailor hands-off instruction to each individual's mechanical skill and comfort level. In 2024, 1338 members of our community, including 51 youth, utilized the BICAS tools and bike stands to repair their bikes, over the span of 2576 sessions. All the tools needed for repairs are available in our space.

Work Trade

Our primary means of lowering bars of bicycle accessibility occurs through our Work Trade program, which provides all individuals, regardless of income, an avenue to earn BICAS shop credit. This can be used to repair their bicycle, purchase used parts, or earn a bike — all gained while developing their skills and helping with shop tasks. We are proud to have worked with 594 work trade users this year, including 62 youth participants, across 2033 sessions.

Community Service Workers and Drop-In Volunteers

On a drop-in basis, BICAS continues to provide verified community service and during our open hours. In 2024, 145 individuals, including 60 youth, across 444 sessions, earned community service credit for court-ordered cases and school volunteer programs. These workers completed 1279 total hours in the shop!



Display Insert

In August, BICAS staff constructed a stunning new display case insert, replacing the glass with an intricate sheet of interwoven bicycle parts. This unique creation not only showcases our commitment to upcycled art throughout our shop, but is also a striking testament to the creativity and resourcefulness that occupies our space!

Our Bikes

To keep costs low, we sell recycled bicycles in three tiers of refurbishment, at the skilled hands of our mechanics: as-is bikes, ready-to-ride, and floor bikes — ranging from as-donated to as-new. In 2024, 137 people earned bikes through the use of our work trade program, including 7 youth. Additionally, 1102 bikes were purchased, including 1080 as-is bikes, which are also fully available with work trade credit.

And More Bikes

Apart for the bicycles we sell in our shop, the bicycles and parts that are donated to us are used for our mechanics classes and youth camps, for creating art, and through other means of providing bicycles through many partnerships with other community organizations. 76 heavily discounted bikes were brought to Togo by Domain of Africa, a nonprofit that helps support people in need with a variety of essential services, as well as bicycle transportation. For overflow donations that cannot be used, we recycle scrap metal at the local recycling plant Reyco, the proceeds of which then goes back into funding our community programs!

Online Sales

We continue to recognize the value of online sale for those who cannot easily make it to our shop. In 2024, our eBay sales brought in over \$22,177.70 net revenue for our community programs.



Art is the A in BICAS ...

CREATIVITY IS WOVEN INTO BICAS – from our history, to our structure, to the programs we offer – lowering barriers to the arts is fundamental to our mission. From function to fashion, from sculpture to jewelry, upcycled bicycle art transforms discarded bicycle parts into works of renewal and self-expression – reflecting our commitment both to environmental sustainability and creative empowerment.

A sanctuary of invention, the scent of welded steel mingled with open air flavors BICAS. Crates brim with salvaged derailleurs, fenders, and spokes. Opposite, stands an eclectic collection of crafting materials. Once-discarded bicycle parts, unfit for the road but perfect for crafting, reimagine what might be possible. Guided by Art Coordinator Antonio – through Crafternoons, community workshops, markets, and the transformative impact of bicycle art – BICAS Art remains committed to accessibility.



Weekly Crafting Hours

In 2024, our weekly crafting hours remained at the heart of our programs for accessibility of the arts. Community members who dropped into Art Corners and Crafternoons had full access to our array of beads, wire, sewing materials, markers, and other crafting materials to create art alongside staff — as well as recycled bike parts! In 2024, 147 people attended our 41 Art Corners and Crafternoons — enjoying quiet, creative spaces where we could all be inspired by one another!

Art Parts

Parts salvaged from bicycles that are no longer usable for mechanics are often perfect for art. We keep these parts in stock, both for our uses and for that of others — all available to the public by donation. These parts demonstrate the creative ripple effect between mechanics and creativity — expanding throughout our wider community of artists and welders. Art parts were salvaged from 1100 bikes in 2024.

Mini Gallery

The start of January saw the exciting grand opening of our Mini Gallery! With our downtown location historically home to a gallery, we were ecstatic to unveil a space here where the community can fully immerse themselves in bicycle-themed art — all crafted from bike parts, or inspired by bicycles. Our gallery was honored to collaborate with the Arts Foundation for Tucson and Southern Arizona for their Open Studio Tour in December.

Art Display Around Town

In addition to our gallery, we were thrilled to display our unique welded art — available for sale — at Button Brewery, Community Foundation Campus, and Dragoon Brewery!

Art Volunteers

Thank you to our local artists who volunteered to help out the art program — from preparing bike parts for art at Art Volunteer Drop-Ins, to set up for art events and art markets, to so much more!



Art Workshops

2024 saw the return of art workshops — classes which provided specialized instruction on different areas of art, separate from our free weekly drop-in hours. We hosted 10 art workshops in 2024, led by community artists and BICAS staff. All but two of these were held at BICAS — the notable exceptions being the incredible Paint and Sip in April, a fun, relaxed painting course held in collaboration with Painting and Vino Tucson at Dragoon Brewery; as well as a windchime-making workshop held at Pueblo Vida Brewery that same month.

Welding Workshops

In 2024, we were positively thrilled to launch welding workshops for our community — this has been a long-held dream! A traditionally exclusionary art form, our commitment to accessibility and inclusivity remained at the forefront: with a sliding scale cost and accommodations to that all of our students to end their first workshop having created their own unique, hand-welded pieces. Through the end of 2024, 3 of our former welding students have continued to utilize the welder and materials for their own projects during our weekly art drop-ins! Half of our 2024 welding participants were women. As we forge forth through the coming year, we are committed to expanding opportunities for welders by countering the gender-based structural barriers that pervade welding spaces.

Art Markets

BICAS Art remained a staple at local art markets throughout 2024 — having a presence at 9: #ThisIsTucson, Tucson Together Art Market, Floozy Flea Market, Made In Tucson Market, Tucson Zine Fest, Makers Market at the Tuxcon, Dragoon Fall Market, and both

Cyclovias! These events help expand awareness of our art programs, while directly funding them through the art we sell — empowering ever more community members to learn and create.

Online Art Sales

For community near and far, we continue to sell art online, bringing in \$749.05 for our community-focused art programs in 2024, and mailing 20 community members welded bicycle art and BICAS merch.



New Merch

Parallel to the welded and handmade art created by staff and community artists — we also introduced new printed merch in 2024! We premiered 5 new original designs, including a cropped hoodie (a first for us!), 2 new t-shirts, 2 stickers, and 1 postcard. Additionally, we brought back 5 classic designs in fresh variations, including our constellation hoodie in a new color, the gear-decorated bandana in a new color, 2 popular t-shirt designs — and (most exciting of all!) — a design which before had only been seen on a vintage BICAS poster from over two decades ago, printed for the first time on a shirt.



In 2024, we held 2 Art Mart events, our community art market where local artists sell their work. These were our 5th annual Spring Art Mart in March with 25 wonderful artist vendors, and our 2nd Annual Art Mart at Dark in September with 23 artist vendors! Also at the markets were the delicious Amelias and Hugo's and Frozen Delight 520, and the melodious Hella Fitzgerald and In Phase Entertainment; as well as art activities, a raffle, prizes, and exciting new BICAS merch designs! Always a wonderful time, Art Mart lowers barriers for working artists through a "by donation" vendor contribution.

our annual art fundraiser...

FOR THE FIRST TIME, our 27th Annual Art Auction was held at the BICAS shop — our space transformed into a luminous dreamscape for one night. Across the dark sky, twinkling lights were woven into the night through twine above our yard. Heat lamps cut through the evening chill, and music filled the air. As always, the art adorning every surface was a testament to Tucson's generous and thriving arts community; we are endlessly grateful to the artist donors who support accessible transportation in our community, for making this night possible!

Our biggest fundraiser of the year, the Art Auction is a celebration of creativity, community, and resilience. Between lively bidding, warm food, cold ice cream, a prize wheel, live music, and hands-on crafting — the night pulsed with creativity and love! What a feeling to wrap up 2024 — in joyful community with the amazing, beautiful, wonderful people who make everything we do possible.





Art Auction Designs

In 2024, we returned to our roots, by holding a contest in June for an official Art Auction design. BICAS has experimented with different approaches to this special illustration in recent years whether staff-created or externally commissioned. We are so grateful for the generosity of the community artists who made this contest possible! Lee Ferris created the winning design, which was printed on the official Art Auction poster, t-shirt, and postcard. The breathtaking runner-ups were Peggy Dolaghan and John Bennett, whose designs were printed on vinyl Art Auction stickers. All proceeds go towards our mission to promote accessibility for bicycle transportation and the arts.

Deepest thanks to our volunteers...

OUR VOLUNTEERS are our lifeblood. From mechanics, to group rides, to bringing their vibrant work to events throughout the year, their dedication amplifies the work of BICAS. Led powerfully by our Volunteer & Outreach Coordinator Joselyn until her departure in May, and by all of the vibrant members of the committee yearlong, the impact of our volunteers resonated all throughout 2024 — helping us ensure that bikes and knowledge reach those who need them most.

To every volunteer who has given their time, energy, and passion to BICAS, we extend our deepest gratitude. Your commitment sustains makes our programs thrive, and multiplies the work we do together. We are endlessly thankful and can't wait to see what we accomplish together in the year ahead!

Volunteers at BICAS

We had 31 volunteers, who worked 161 hours in 2024 — which is nearly 4 times as much as the year prior! They worked on mechanics projects, staffed events, and helped worked towards our mission of transportation accessibility in all kinds of ways. The \$3139 that our volunteers saved BICAS in labor costs were channelled back into all of the programs we do in the community. The work they have done was indispensable. Thank you to our volunteers!



Volunteer Orientations

In 2024, we continued our no-commitment Volunteer Orientations, making volunteering accessible and approachable for our community. These orientations formed a solid cornerstone for the treasured relationships BICAS staff build with our volunteers. We held 10 of these in 2024, attended by 32 people interested to learn about how to get started volunteering with BICAS.

Volunteer T-Shirt Party

In September, BICAS held a community activity where volunteers could decorate their own BICAS Volunteer shirts — tees, tanks, and shirts of all styles — unified in design not only by BICAS stencils, but the vibrant creativity of our space. 3 volunteers attended alongside 4 of our staff in advance of Cyclovia. We provided pizza and drinks, and painted shirts of all kinds with brushes, stencils, and stamps!



voluminous Outreach...

A CRUCIAL BRIDGE between BICAS and the wider Tucson community, our Outreach program serves as a primary point of connection to bring bicycles, resources, and knowledge to reach those who need them most. In 2024, our outreach impact expanded, deepening our engagement with populations we serve.

From block parties to university fairs, from markets to community events, our outreach endeavors are paramount. As we continue to forge new connections and strengthen existing relationships, the staff in our Volunteer & Outreach Committee remain dedicated to bringing bicycle education and resources to underserved communities.

Lutheran Social Services

We were excited to partner with Lutheran Social Services to provide 45 refugee participants with bicycles, along with BICAS credit and scholarships for our Basic Maintenance course — empowering them with both reliable transportation and the skills to maintain it.

Just Communities

Through our collaboration with Just Communities, we were able to offer free bike repair to 35 participants, ensuring they had safe, working bicycles in our shared organizational commitment to accessible transportation for all.

Events across town

Whether at neighborhood block parties or open streets events, BICAS has had outreach all over Tucson! In 2024, BICAS had a presence at 15 community events, bringing various activities with us — whether information about our services, or our fun bike course, or the blender bike, or the prize wheel, or mobile mechanics, or something more! BICAS connected with 727 people through outreach events in 2024.

Cyclovia

For our 10th year, BICAS had a presence at both Spring and Fall editions of Cyclovia, a biannual car-free community celebration organized by Living Streets Alliance to create open streets — which regularly sees more than 50,000 participants! In 2024, we offered free bike repair for cyclists, as well as spins on our prize wheel in exchange for signing up for our newsletter. Cyclovia-goers made art at our craft table, and rode through our bike course on our unique mutant bikes! For sale, we brought BICAS Art and merch. Everyone had so much fun!



Mobile Mechanics

Our mobile mechanics help community members fix their bikes at events around town! In 2024, BICAS had mobile mechanics were at 5 events, with our mobile mechanics fixing 122 bikes for people free of charge.

Institute for Studies of Global Prosperity Conference

In August, BICAS welcomed 23 students from the Institute for Studies of Global Prosperity Conference for a shop visit and bike dismantling session. It was an significant step in expanding the impact of our mission, and an exciting first for the current Volunteer & Outreach committee — as college students from across the nation gathered to hear about BICAS' history, what we do, and how we work with the communities that come into BICAS.

Women, trans people of all genders, and femmes...

IN SPACES CENTERED around mechanics, which historically have excluded those who are not cis men, our Women/Trans/Femme (WTF) programming remains a vital part of our work against gender discrimination — creating spaces where women, transgender people of all genders, and femmes can feel confident while working on bikes.

Fostered throughout 2024 under the care of our former WTF Coordinator, Lee, until their departure at the end of the year — these programs empower our WTF community to build confidence, community, and mechanical skills in an environment welcoming for them. We remain dedicated to ensuring that bicycle mechanics — and the autonomy, safety, and empowerment it provides — are accessible to all, regardless of gender.

Women/Trans/Femme Workshop

Each Monday, warm camaraderie transforms our shop during the Women/Trans/Femme (WTF) Workshop, which exists at the heart of our WTF programming, and our work to break down systematic gender barriers. For 4 hours, participants have access to Community Tools, Work Trade, Community Service, and our full purchasing selection — all in a welcoming, WTF-staffed environment. In 2024, over 431 people attended the WTF Workshops: building skills, sharing knowledge, and being part of the community.

Gender-Affirming Apparel with Valid USA

During Spring and early Summer months, on second Mondays of the month, we partnered with Valid USA to host free gender-affirming apparel for trans youth under 24. At our shop, they gave out free packers, binders, and underwear, with free raffles for prosthetic breasts. Together, we hosted 6 of these events at BICAS in 2024.

WTF Classes

Staffed by WTF-identifying instructors and scheduled concurrently with WTF Workshops, these classes provide a more structured context wherein to learn mechanics skills amongst fellow WTF students in a safe environment. In 2024, we held two WTF Basic Maintenance classes, where students got to know their bikes better, including learning to make common repairs; these classes had 3 and 7 students. We also held one WTF Build-a-Bike — a 5-session course on subsequent Mondays where 7 participants completely overhauled a bicycle — from start to finish.





WTF Rides

A highlight of community, our WTF group rides follow our workshops on the last Monday of the month. These 5–10 mile group rides are party paced, no drop rides, to be accessible for many fitness levels. In 2024, 117 people participated on these WTF rides, each of them with a different theme: including the annual Spring Fling, where we make corsages of bike tubes! In June, we were excited to collaborate with Queer AF for the Pride Ride, where we biked to a playground and had an enormous blast! Our most-attended ride was the final ride of the year in December, which had 18 attendees!

WTF Films

On some last Mondays of the month, when the weather doesn't work out for group rides, films are the go-to! The WTF program hosted 3 films as a group in 2024. In July, we watched Wadjda, a Saudi Arabian film about a little girl who wants a bike to beat her friend racing. In October, we watched Bit, a film about a trans teen who joins a group of vampires in Los Angeles. Accompanying this movie was a bike costume crafting project and lots of candy corn! Additionally, we hosted another film in March, open to all, in collaboration with Radical Adventure Riders — In the Dirt, a documentary about a group of Native American cyclists who attempt to bring the sport of mountain biking to the Navajo Nation. All proceeds went to the filmmakers and the nonprofit Silver Stallions Bicycle & Coffee.

Trans Day of Remembrance

For the third year in a row, BICAS WTF joined Kindred Connections' event for Trans Day of Remembrance in **November**, honoring stolen trans lives with a Community Altar, shared food, resources, and community care. We connected in reverence with 39 people at this event.

The power of mechanics classes...

EDUCATION HAS ALWAYS been the heart of our mission — equipping our community with the skills and confidence to maintain their own bicycles. In 2024, our education programming flourished under the leadership of our dedicated Education Coordinator, Emilia, who guided the program through another year of growth and learning.

For those seeking hands-on instruction beyond Community Tools, our public classes offer structured, accessible learning opportunities year-round. These courses, structured to demystify bicycle maintenance, provide the knowledge and skills necessary for self-sufficiency and advanced mechanics education. As we continue to evolve, our commitment to education never wavers, nor to ensuring that every rider has the tools — both literal and figurative — to keep their wheels turning.

Five-Month Class Sale

For 5 months in 2024, we applied a massive discount in our commitment to making our classes more widely accessible - made possible through grant funding. From January through May, our class prices were drastically reduced, fully payable with Work Trade. During these months only, the cost of our one-day classes (Modern Mountain Bike, Basic Maintenance, Brake Clinic, and Gear Clinic) were reduced by 77% to \$10. and the cost of our 6-session (24 total hours) Build-a-Bike Class was reduced by **58%** to **\$50**.

Class Intake

At the dawn of 2024, the first day of January began the public-facing use of the an-new, smoother interface for the class intake forms, which community members used to sign up for many of our classes and camps — via the more streamlined Keela. Creating an easier interface for signups is one way of lowering barriers.





Our Mechanics Classes

For those who prefer a more structured learning journey than in Community Tools, we continue to offer regular classes. In 2024, our Basic Maintenance class — where participants learn how to patch a flat, bicycle terminology relevant to their own bike, and introductory drivetrain and brake adjusting — and Build-a-Bike class — where students revive bikes that have been donated to BICAS by taking apart its systems and putting them back together — remained our most timelessly popular. Together with Wheel Building, Modern Mountain Bike Maintenance, Gear Clinic, and Brake Clinic, we saw 82 students graduate from our mechanics courses in 2024, and gave out 19 scholarships to make the classes more accessible.

Basic Maintenance

In 2024, our 3-hour Basic Maintenance course remained our most popular and frequently offered class. This beginner-friendly course equips students with essential bicycle maintenance skills, whether for their own bike or general knowledge. By teaching fundamental repairs and upkeep, the class empowers riders to stay self-sufficient and extend the lifespan of their bicycles. Over the year, 54 students participated in these classes, gaining hands-on experience to tackle common issues on the road with confidence.

Wheel Building

BICAS remains one of the only locations in Tucson where people can learn the advanced, specialized skill of wheel-building! From measuring hubs, rims and spokes — to truing the final wheel — this 2-session, 8-hour course takes participants on an in-depth and hands-on journey. In November, our Wheel Building class guided 6 community members through building a true bicycle wheel!

Wrenching with youth...

OUR YOUTH PROGRAMS remain a vital thread in the tapestry of transportation accessibility. Those too young to drive often rely on bicycles as their primary means of transportation; and in 2024, we saw even more young people engaged with our programs. Under the wing of our skilled Youth Coordinator, Olivia, who took over the role of the adept Benji in Spring, BICAS continues to cultivate an environment where young people can learn, grow, and express themselves.

Designed to foster autonomy, confidence, and hands-on mechanical skills in a welcoming, low-stress setting — these programs provide spaces for young riders to connect, build community, and gain the tools they need — both on and off the bike — to navigate the world with independence.

Ochoa Bike Club

Through a weekly bike club, in partnership with JVYC, we helped kids learn safe riding habits, bike-handling skills, traffic awareness, and basic mechanical knowledge — helping them fix their bikes after school during certain times of year and equipping their cycling futures. In 2024, we assisted young people at 20 bike club sessions.

Youth On Their Own Bike Rack

In March, we were excited to weld a bike rack for Youth On their Own, an organization which supports high school graduation and continued success of youth experiencing homelessness in Pima County. They painted it beautifully!



Youth Earn-a-Bike

We hosted Youth Earn-a-Bike Camps during Summer, Spring, and Fall breaks, where young riders earned their own bicycles, locks, and shop credit by learning mechanics and participating in fun activities. Our YEAB Camps teach essential repair skills while encouraging teamwork and new friendships. In 2024, 19 Youth-Earn-a-Bike participants ages 9-13 went home not only with a bike, but with the confidence and mechanical know-how to navigate their futures. We were honored to hold one of our closed summer sessions exclusively in collaboration with JVYC!

Youth Drop-in

September saw the return of our weekly Youth Drop-In program on Saturdays, providing young people ages 9 to 18 with hands-on experience in bicycle repair and special mechanics projects. These include one-on-one mechanics instruction for free, community service hours, or a space to earn shop credit, which can then be used toward bike parts, one complete bike once per year, or Community Tools time for youth over 13 to receive assistance outside of Youth Drop-In hours. We held 12 Youth Drop-Ins in 2024.

Youth in the Shop

In 2024, 51 youth utilized the BICAS tools, mechanics assistance, and bike stands in Community Tools over the span of 89 sessions. Work Trade credit — which can be used to repair a bicycle through Community Tools, or to purchase used parts or a bike — was earned by 62 youth participants, across 171 sessions. BICAS continues to be one of the few places that offers verified community service to youth during our open hours; and 60 youth, across 444 sessions, earned community service credit for court-ordered cases and school volunteer programs. This was almost twice as many as the year prior!

Fundraising our community programs...

OUR DONORS PROVIDE the foundation that keeps BICAS thriving – far from merely keeping the lights on, but empowering our community programs to expand, and more fully serve the needs of our community. As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, we depend on the generosity of our donors to fulfill our mission. Every refurbished bicycle begins as a donation, before being carefully restored by our skilled mechanics. Every welded art piece is shaped from donated bike parts, then transformed into something new.

Through the passion and dedication of our Development Coordinator, Kristen, 2024 continued an exponential rise of donations through our fundraising endeavors. To all who have contributed, who have in any way donated to BICAS – your support ensures that BICAS continues to serve, create, and grow. Your belief in our mission makes everything we do possible.

Our Sustainers

Still fledgling at the beginning of 2024, the BICAS Membership program continued to grow and flourish throughout the year, which enables our community to give monthly donations to support our programs while receiving special benefits. We were honored to welcome 6 new sustainers in 2024, totaling 8 as the year ended!

New CRM

In 2024, first day of **January** heralded the external and internal use of a new CRM in Keela. Not only did this new CRM increase our fundraising capacity, powering our community programs; the improved tracking empowered us to more easily show appreciation for our generous donors.

El Tour

For yet another year, BICAS participated in El Tour de Tucson, in a program where people in the community can bypass the fee to ride El Tour while raising funds for BICAS. In 2024, Team BICAS riders raised \$1,000 for our community programs!

Our Donors

Monetary and in-kind, gifts from our donors empower the work we do — demonstrating their commitment to our mission of transportation accessibility. Between immense donor generosity and our consistent fundraising programs, 2024 brought a spectacular 76% increase of donations.

Beer for Bikes

In August, we hosted our annual Beer for Bikes fundraiser with Dragoon Brewery! Attendees enjoyed a night of community and celebration, receiving a Dragoon drink ticket, a BICAS sticker, shop credit, and art coupons. With beer from Dragoon and hot food from Muncheez Food Truck, the event featured a lively raffle and prize games, with special prizes by A Nice World, donated in honor of her philanthropic jewelry line having generously supported BICAS for 10 years — an anniversary marked by beautifully designed BICAS pendants.

Fundraiser at Pueblo Vida

In May, we teamed up with Pueblo Vida for an additional Beer for Bikes fundraising event — bringing together delicious drinks, good company, and community support. The night featured games, gift cards, stickers, and beer tickets, alongside delicious desserts from Dedicated GF and The Black Top Grill. Ensenada Street Food also kept everyone deliciously well-fed. The highlight of the evening — a lively bar trivia game — put local knowledge and fun facts to the test!

Halloween Bike Ride


In October, we hosted a fantastic Halloween-themed ride — our most successful fundraiser of 2024 outside the Art Auction! For a \$12 contribution, 16 riders participated, many dressed in costume. All ages joined! To accommodate different paces, we split into two groups and rode from BICAS to the Tucson Hop Shop, which generously donated a portion of the night's drink sales to BICAS. The evening was filled with festive fun — including a costume contest, candy, and delicious pizza from Ciao Down Pizza Studio, which shares a space with Tucson Hop Shop. We are so grateful for their support — and for everyone who rode with us that night.



Through the internet...

ACCESS TO INFORMATION is as a crucial first step in empowering access to new opportunities, which makes our online presence vital to our mission. The internet is a vehicle to bridge these gaps — ensuring that essential resources, updates, and ultimately bicycles reach those who may not be in the shop every week. Dialogue stands at the heart of community-building, and we are committed to keeping information accessible.

In 2024, we expanded our online presence — whether strengthening online collaborations, refining our Instagram presence with new story icons, or launching new monthly newsletters to keep our community engaged with specific activities. We remain committed to evolving our digital presence in tandem with the needs of our community.



In August, we were excited to film, edit, and produce a 3-minute informational video for a Twitch 'telethon' by Camp Groundworks, a Tucson music festival. This festival was hosted by Groundworks, a Tucson sober all-ages venue that works to promote local youth art and foster self empowerment within the music scene. The video premiered over the Labor Day weekend in September, providing comprehensive visual information on our programs.

Testimonials

In June, we began an initiative to ask our community for their impact stories through a QR code on repair stands. While fully anonymous — similarly to the stories we collected (with permission) from those who filled out our anonymous demographic survey — this initiative not only further enabled us to more publicly appreciate our community, but by increasingly demonstrated to donors that their giving really does make a difference in people's lives! In the immediate term, impact stories increased donations by 25%.

Our Newsletters

In 2024, we corresponded with our community through 4 times as many newsletters as the year prior — a total of 71 newsletters! This was accomplished through expanding our selection of monthly interest newsletters, in addition to the general newsletter, which also saw an annual redesign — delivering on our promise of the interest areas indicated by our subscribers.

In March, we were proud to launch our monthly Art newsletter — which highlights: a monthly gallery piece, a monthly piece of art piece on our online shop, and our monthly featured community artist; in addition to listing our upcoming workshops, and unveiling art announcements! In May, to thank our donors and demonstrate the value of their donations, we expanded our previously-quarterly Fundraising newsletter into another monthly newsletter, featuring: impact stories, membership information, and more. For other interests, our special event newsletters increased significantly. We also continued email newsletters to announce our Volunteer Orientations.

We gained 773 subscribers over the course of 2024, ending the year with 3,729 subscribers. Our average newsletter open rate was 37,4%. This is almost twice as high as the national average for email newsletters! The newsletter with the most outbound clicks was the monthly Art newsletter in July, with 45% of these clicks going to our online art store — followed closely by our interview with the featured community artist for that month!

In addition to the 71 newsletters, we also sent 31 special emails through our new CRM to our donor and volunteer audiences; we remain committed to our relationships with those who support us.

Our Instagram

For many, especially younger demographics, social media is the primary source for local news. In 2024, we had 140 posts on our main account bicastucson — a massive 56% increase from our posts the previous year! We also posted 369 stories, which was 46 more than the previous year. Our most viewed post, announcing the date of the Art Auction, was viewed by 5,200 people — more than doubling the previous year's most viewed post. Our most liked post was a collab post between our bicastucson and bicas_wtf accounts: this was a photo carousel of the WTF ride in Mdy, linking to an article on our website fondly recounting the event.


All of our accounts — bicastucson, bicas_wtf, bicasart, and bicasyouth — received follower growth in 2024! We standardized the icons for our story highlights on our bicastucson and bicas_wtf accounts for ease of consumption. Our secondary accounts (bicas_wtf, bicasart, and bicasyouth) posted 11% more collectively than the previous year; with bicasart seeing the biggest increase with 23 more posts than the previous year, and bicas_wtf having 12 more posts than the previous year! Dedicated to presenting greater cohesion for our followers, we also increased the regularity of our collab posts between our accounts, with bicastucson engaging in 54 collab posts. Our bicastucson account also shared collab posts with 7 outside organizations, artists, and entities aligned with our mission! We are excited to expand information of our services to so many more people.

Google Ads

In April, we were excited to launch an account for Google Ad Grants for Nonprofits! Through this most visited website on the internet, we've been able to expand awarenesses of our services, bringing more people into the shop. Through Google Ad Grants for Nonprofits, 500 people were shown our ads on Google, Gmail, and Youtube — out of those, 93 visited our website. 1 of our ads, which launched in October, featured a video.

During our brief, 1-week-long foray into paid Google Ads (which are prioritized over Google Ad Grants for Nonprofits), we received an additional 383 clicks from those who were shown our ad — 56% of the people who viewed it!

Our two most popular ads in 2024 were tied at 39 clicks; one promoting our shop during the summer lull beginning in May, and the other promoting our Art Auction beginning in November.



Our Facebook

In 2024, the BICAS Tucson Facebook account had 132 total posts, which was 11 more than the previous year. We also increasingly focused on our expanding graphics library, for use in all our accounts and flyers — reutilizing vintage BICAS gems alongside new designs.

Our Website

Our first full year with the new, responsive website design, 2024 saw a massive 40% increase from the previous year's website visitors — with approximately 2686 monthly visitors to site! The most popular page, apart from the front page, was Refurbished Bicycles — a sign that our digital avenues are also furthering bicycle accessibility.

Website Carousel

2024 saw a dedicated push to put BICAS news front and center on our front page — nearly doubling the number of posts from the previous year with 51 web posts! Of these, included: our 12 monthly artist features (plus one spotlight on our Art Auction artist), interviewing local artists — 5 narrative posts, where we describe in story-like prose one instance of a recurring event (a Volunteer Orientation, a WTF ride, a day at Art Corner) — and 3 additional in-depth interviews, sharing stories from our donors or staff in journalistic style. Ensuring regular posts is a crucial part of ensuring that website visitors retain up-to-to-date information, and highlighting the many voices that make BICAS thrive.

Gross Income




